As we reach the midpoint of 2025, we see lives changing. We see children finding safety and daring to dream again. What keeps us inspired and moving forward are these stories of hope and your commitment to building a brighter future with us.

Every first half of the year is a time of deep reflection for us as we evaluate the impact of our work over the past months and consider the possibilities for transforming lives together in the months ahead. It is also a moment of sincere gratitude, as we look back and see how your kindness has sustained us; holding the lifeline for the children who depend on us.

Each new child we rescue reminds us why we must keep standing for the vulnerable. While no two stories are exactly the same, the odds they face are often the same—homelessness, hunger, abuse, disease, deep-rooted family poverty and other difficult socio-economic conditions that children did not create and cannot overcome on their own. We often wonder: what would have been their way out without help from someone? Without intervention, many children remain trapped in cycles of despair and the grip of generational poverty.

This reality is what convinces us to remain committed not just to providing education, but also shelter, meals, healthcare, and emotional support. It has never been easy to deliver this kind of holistic support. In today's tough economy, it is now more challenging to deliver a comprehensive, integrated programme but we are convinced that this is the only way to truly transform the life of a child, especially those we serve: the street-connected, homeless, displaced, orphaned, abused, and vulnerable. Our mission is to help children truly heal, grow, and take back the power to defeat the challenges that have held back several generations before them.

It is a vision to reach 1 million more African children excluded from school over the next two years.

The road ahead is long and our resources are lean. We are essentially bootstrapping a solution far bigger than our resources. Our hope is that – maybe, just maybe – one child, or a hundred, or even millions, will receive the light of education through this effort.

Rescued and Restored: 11 More Children Find Home

Abandoned. Abused. Hungry. Homeless. Exploited. These were once the painful realities of the 11 children who joined our family in the first half of this year. Each child carries a unique story and a silent cry for help.

One unforgettable moment unfolded in February, deep within the chaos of Ibadan's largest market. There, we found the Ajayi siblings unkempt, roaming and begging just to survive. Amid the bustling of the market, their silent cries were easy to miss. But to those willing to look closely, they were loud and heartbreaking.

Rescuing them wasn't easy. We faced resistance from those who profited off their suffering, people who saw them as economic tools rather than children. Side by side with law enforcement, we fought to bring them to safety. Thanks to the collaborative efforts of the Oyo State Ministry of Women and Social Inclusion and law enforcement, the three siblings were rescued from the grip of modern-day slavery.

Rescued and Restored: 11 More Children Find Home

Today, they live in safety. They have a warm bed, nourishing meals, clean clothes, access to education and a chance to simply be children again. They laugh. They learn. They heal. And every night, they sleep peacefully under a roof called home.

Then there's Femi, a young boy who had been out of school for over 10 years. After losing his mother, his father abandoned him on the streets of Lagos and returned to Delta State. Femi survived by doing odd jobs: cleaning bakeries, working on construction sites, sleeping wherever nightfall found him. Today, Femi has a safe bed, regular meals, and something he never imagined he would have – the promise of an education.

And Sarah.

Born to a single mother who later remarried, Sarah was not welcome in her mother's new home. She was handed off to an "aunty from the city," and from there, passed from one household to another. She became a domestic slave caring for children and elderly, hawking on the streets, often going hungry.

Each morning, as other children walked to school, Sarah stood by the roadside, watching them pass by, longing for a life she believed was beyond her reach.

These are just a few of the many stories that show why this work matters. Thanks to your support, we continue to rescue children and restore hope. Together, we are giving them the one thing every child deserves – a chance to live and thrive.

Stability, Schooling and Success



90% of children who wrote JAMB scored significantly above national average of 200 marks

15 children await admission into universities by end of 2025

85% of the children under residential care performed above average in all academic assessments taken in H1

In the first half of the year, 108 children were under our residential care. Beyond providing shelter, giving children a stable home environment has created the foundation for consistent schooling and improved academic performance.

In the past six months, 85% of the children scored above average in all school assessments. Among those who sat for the university matriculation exam (JAMB UTME), 90% scored significantly above the national midline score of 200. As a result, 15 more teenagers are now on track and prepared for university admission in the upcoming school year.

A Digital School for Every Child – OurSchool.africa Has Launched!



18.3 million – that’s the number of out-of-school children in Nigeria today according to UNICEF but these aren’t just numbers. They are children whose dreams are on hold, whose futures are uncertain. Many live in remote villages where schools don’t exist, or in displacement camps with no access to classrooms or teachers.

We knew we had to act. That’s why we launched OurSchool.africa, a digital school created for children who need education the most.

With pre-recorded curriculum-based lessons, our platform is designed to work offline or online, using low-cost mobile devices, smartboards, and solar-powered hubs to deliver quality education to even the hardest-to-reach places.

We’ve launched the beta version but the journey is just beginning. We see a great promise for educating children in slums, IDP camps, and remote communities. With a strong focus on Northern Nigeria where the out-of-school crisis is most severe, the launch of *OurSchool* starts our mission to take education to children just where they are.

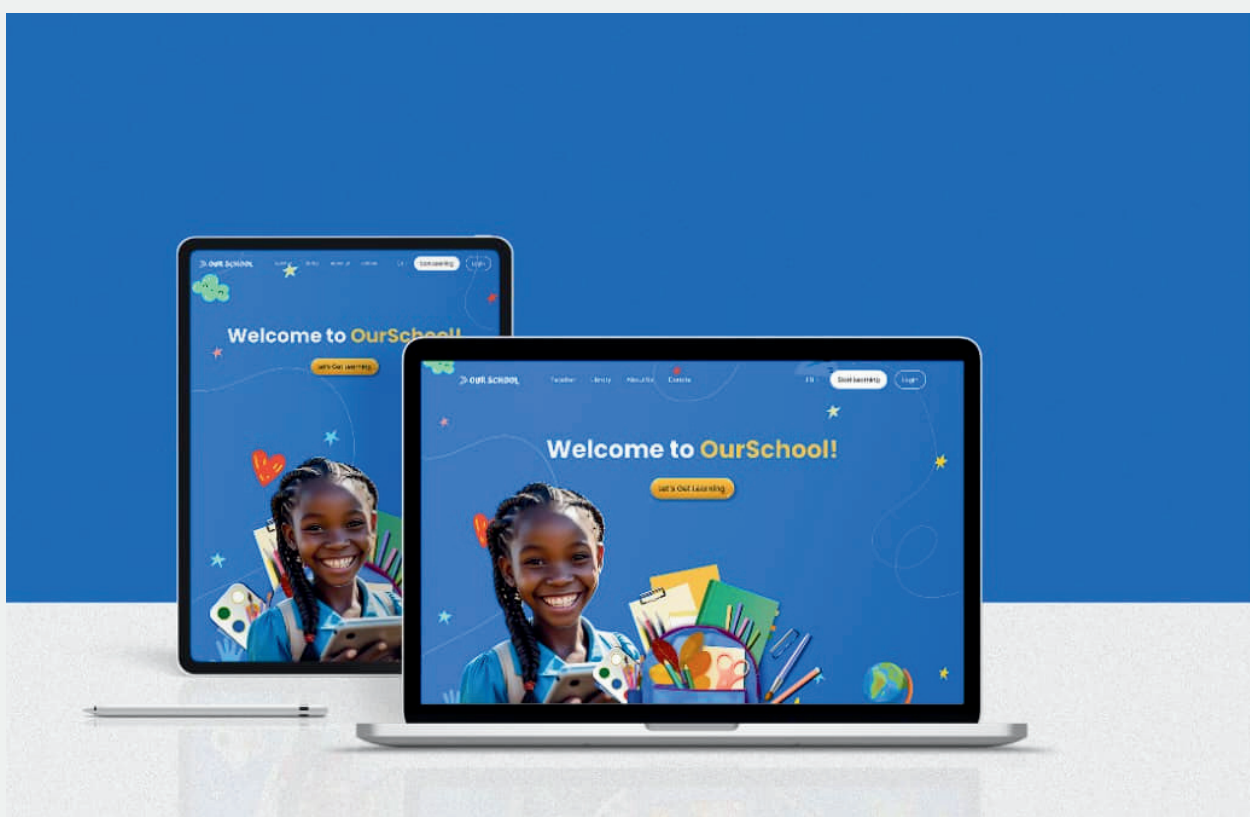

A Gift That Keeps on Teaching: City Church Lagos and the Birth of OurSchool

City Church's support for OurSchool.africa is the single most important factor transforming the ambitious idea into a working solution. At a time when we needed to set up a functional recording studio to begin production of over 1,000 video lessons covering the Nigerian basic education curriculum, City Church made a critical donation that enabled us to purchase media equipment and build the studio infrastructure.

This studio became the heartbeat of OurSchool's content production—where the learning videos, songs, and audio materials that now reach children in disconnected communities are created. Their timely generosity gave our team the means to begin building the kind of engaging, high-quality content that would make learning accessible and joyful for out-of-school children.

Beyond equipment and setup, City Church's intervention represents a powerful statement on equity and inclusion. In a country where 18.3 million children are out of school and most edtech solutions are out of reach for the poor, City Church helped birth a platform that is purpose-built for the underserved.

With their support, we were able to launch a digital school that works without internet access—bringing hope and learning to displaced children, those in remote villages, and children living in extreme poverty. City Church didn't just invest in infrastructure; they invested in the future of children who would otherwise be left behind.

From Catch-Up to Excellence: Bridge Learning Centre Learners Thrive in Mainstream Schools

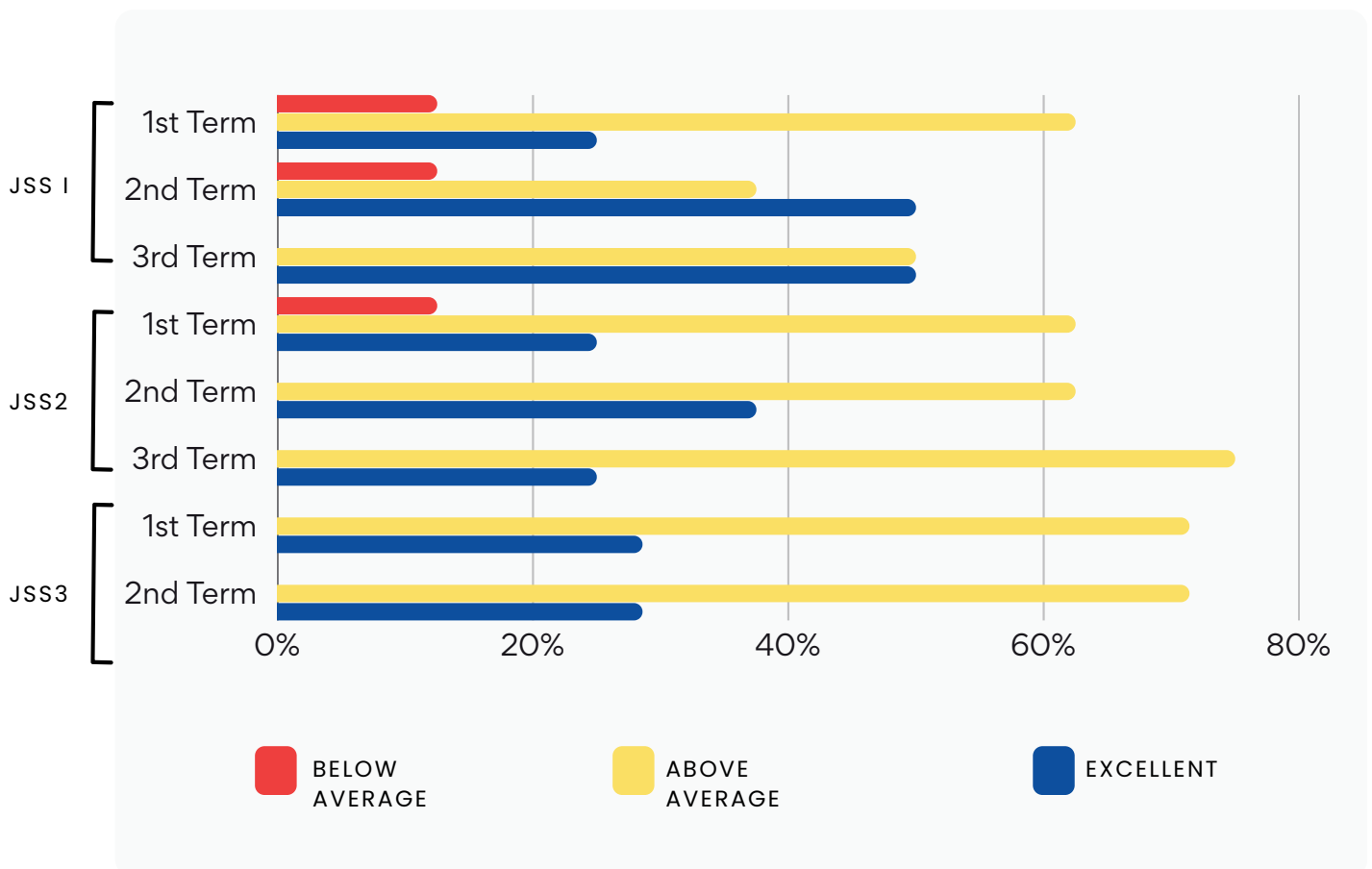
At the Bridge Learning Centre, our mission goes beyond getting over-age, out-of-school children back into school and helping them catch up. We are committed to walking with them every step of the way, creating clear pathways to academic excellence, even after they transition into mainstream secondary education. Our ultimate goal is for every learner not just to re-enter formal schooling, but to thrive.

This year marks a major milestone. For the first time, a cohort of learners who completed our Accelerated Education Programme (AEP) will sit for the Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE). This marks progression into Senior Secondary School. It's an important moment in our AEP journey, and we are hopeful it affirms the strength of the foundation we have built.



Academic Progress Highlight

Despite initial adjustment challenges in the first year of reintegration, all reintegrated learners now perform above average with 28.6% ranking among the top in their classes by the second and third years.



Bridge Learning Centre Learners Thrive in Mainstream Schools

Since their reintegration, we have continued to walk alongside the children. We monitor their adaptability and academic performance in mainstream schools. While the first year presented its share of adjustment challenges, by the second and third years, 100% of the learners were performing above average, with 28.58% ranking among the top in their classes.

To support a smoother transition, we made strategic adjustments to the final stage of our AEP. These include: introducing structured note-taking and exposing learners to more conventional classroom

arrangements, helping them become familiar with traditional school routines.

While maintaining our learner-centred approach, the changes have helped set the stage for a balanced and confident take-off.

Their success confirms what we have always believed: late starters can still learn, grow, and excel. With the right environment and consistent support, they don't just catch up—they soar. Age should never be the reason a child cannot dream.

Halimat Finds the Joy of Learning

At 15, Halimat had lost hope of ever going to school. Years of family displacement meant she never had the chance to be in school or stay long enough to learn anything. But everything changed when she joined Bridge Learning Centre.

For the first time, Halimat found a classroom that welcomed her. She discovered the joy of reading, fell in love with Maths, and began to dream again. Now preparing to reintegrate into secondary school, Halimat sees a future full of possibility. She hopes to become an Engineer. "It's not too late," she says with a smile. And she's proving it every day.

Building School Culture Within Accelerated Learning: The Bridge Learning Centre Experience

Accelerated Education Programmes (AEPs) are designed to help older out-of-school children recover lost years of learning. At the Bridge Learning Centre (BLC), we've come to understand that academic catch-up alone isn't enough. For children who have been left out of school and have experienced life on the margins, recovery must also include identity, values, and a sense of belonging. As BLC approaches a new phase of maturity, we are building a

stronger school culture while maintaining the flexibility of an AEP. From the moment they arrive, learners are welcomed into an environment that mirrors the dignity and feel of a regular school. With structured routines, leadership roles, morning assemblies, and peer learning, children are immersed in a learning community that promotes respect, personal responsibility and integrity.



One of the most powerful tools in shaping this culture is our school anthem which reflects our philosophy of education. We believe education must be functional—preparing learners not just for exams into mainstream school, but for life, purpose and leadership. We teach them to care, to lead, and to take responsibility for the future.

There is a unique value in the social experience of the children who were once excluded from school due to social and economic challenges. Our school for them is structured for hope and modelled as a wellspring of change. We are transmuting the negative past experience into a zeal for social change. This way, we are raising leaders and making our accelerated learning truly transformational beyond bridging education gaps. As children are assisted to catch up on lost years of learning, we are also preparing them to take their place as changemakers.

What's Next:

School Enrolment and Back-to-School

This August, we're launching our school enrolment and back-to-school campaign to support 1,000 children across Nigeria in starting or returning to school. It's always a season of joy and new beginnings for many children who are either put in school for the first time, reintegrated or supported to go back to school.

In 2024 and early 2025, we reached children in Lagos, Taraba, Borno, Gombe, Adamawa, and Oyo but we are determined to go further. With your support, we can open the door to education for even more children and provide the essential school supplies they need to thrive.



What's Next:

We cannot truly empower disadvantaged children if we leave them out of today's most valuable skills – the tools they need to thrive, compete, and lead in the new digital economy.



Tech Bootcamp for 500 Children

In August, our Tech Bootcamp will train 500 underserved children across Lagos, Oyo, Plateau, Abuja, and Taraba in coding, robotics, digital design, and creative arts. Delivered both online and in-person, the bootcamp empowers children especially those almost left behind to imagine, build, and lead in a digital future.

Kids Innovation Challenge and Hackathon

We've announced the 2025 Kids Innovation Challenge, a nationwide tech showcase inviting young innovators especially from underserved backgrounds to solve real-world problems. This September, the Challenge will culminate in a pan-Nigerian hackathon around three themes: using AI for accessible, low-cost education, expanding healthcare access through tech and creating tools to unlock 1 million youth jobs. The Grand Finale will hold in Victoria Island, Lagos on September 20, 2025.



What's Next:

We cannot reintegrate children without empowering the women who hold their homes together. When we empower indigent women with skills and opportunity, we build resilient families and prevent the cycle that pushes children to the streets.



2 More Multimedia Learning Spaces

We're setting up more solar-powered multimedia centres in underserved communities and IDP camps. Each space will serve 1,000 children, powered by OurSchool learning tabs and preloaded digital lessons, enabling learning where teachers and infrastructure are limited.

Project Enable: Empowering Women, Strengthening Families

Women are important partners in our work. Our work of reintegrating children back into families cannot be done without them. We also believe providing early support to indigent women is preventive of total breakdown of household when children take to the streets.

Our Family Empowerment initiative called Project Enable is for them. This project creates skills learning opportunities and facilitates access to finance for low-income women. In the next half of the year, we are expanding our School Factory where we train women and employ them to make back-to-school supplies. We will also empower 100 smallholder farmers in a low-income community under a farmers' cooperative group.

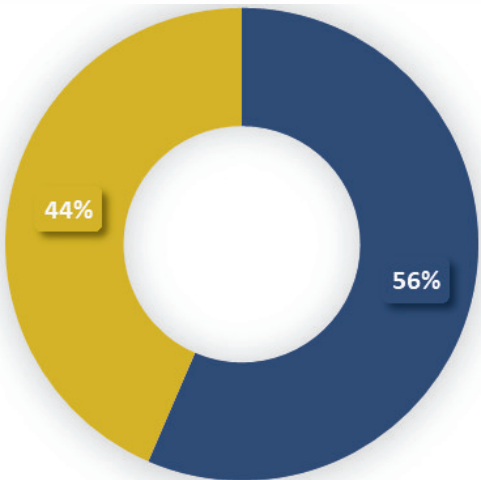

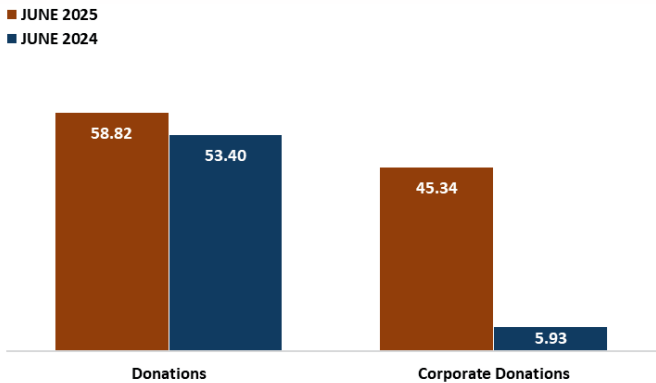


Inflows as at June 2025

Notes:

Education

This comprises the amount spent on school fees for both children under residential care and other beneficiaries of The Destiny Trust education sponsorship or scholarship. It also includes other school related expenses such as allowances for university undergraduates, common entrance fees, purchase of books, stationery, and other school needs. As well as expenses incurred for the operations and maintenance of the Bridge Learning Centre.

Care

This represents the amount spent on the general welfare of resident and non-resident children across the Five (5) centres managed by The Destiny Trust (Family House, Adullam, Esther's Harbour, Igbo-Ora, Idera Homes (Heather's and Tara's Wings), Ibadan). These expenses include feeding (the purchase of bi-weekly food items and supplies for resident children), clothing, purchase of medical supplies/hospital bills, payment of rent/lease of buildings used as shelter, and meal support for families of non-resident children and amount incurred on repairs and maintenance of the home, and medical outreach costs.

Personnel Costs

This comprises the salaries paid to full-time care staff (House keepers, matron, security guards) covering the different homes of The Destiny Trust, teachers and instructors across the various learning and empowerment platforms. The Destiny Trust Founders, Trustees and Executive Board members are not paid salaries, compensation or out-of-pocket expenses.

Empowerment

This represents the amount spent on tech and design skills training under the Kids Innovation Africa initiative. It covers the training activities, the purchase and repairs of computers and other equipment. In addition, this includes the cost for the preparation towards the Kids Innovation Challenge 2025.

Administrative Costs

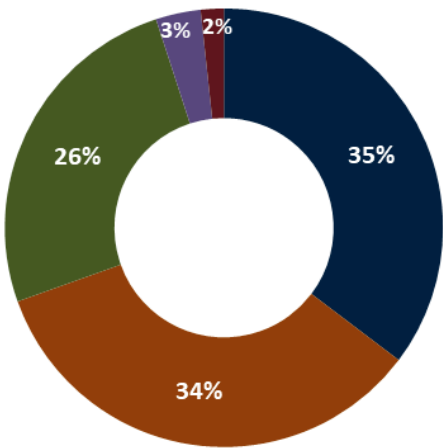
This includes the amount spent on transportation (for example: children's periodic attendance at Family Courts, intra and interstate transportation to boarding schools, government dues/levies for operating a children's home, subscriptions, membership and annual dues, video documentaries for media usage, and the regulatory expenses for newly-admitted children.

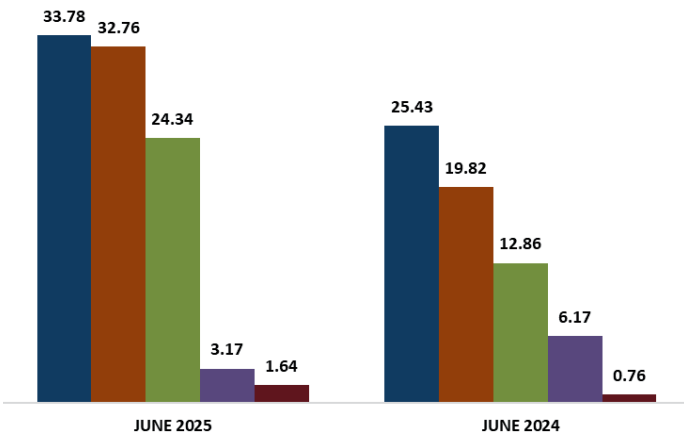
